We can now hope that winter is behind us and we can look forward to spending more time outdoors in our beautiful borough.




There is a full schedule of events for all the family taking us through to the summer months.

Meet our amazing mums

A campaign is being launched in the borough to encourage more new mothers to breastfeed. We spoke to three new mums about the issue.

"FEEDING your child," smiles

new mum Aliya Scarborough, "it's a natural thing – but at the same time it isn't always easy."

As Aliya speaks, other mums in this friendly, chatty breastfeeding group at Guisborough Family Hub nod along and it doesn't take long for a discussion to get going - including about support given to mums who struggled to breastfeed.

The friends are backing a campaign to encourage more mothers to breastfeed in our borough. It's an important issue for our area – latest statistics show that just 55% of new mothers in Redcar and Cleveland initiate breastfeeding for their babies, compared to 72.6% nationally.

Aliya, who gave birth to baby Isla via C-Section, says that support from professionals at the Family Hub had been invaluable.

She said: "We discovered Isla had tongue tie and she lost 13% of her body weight when she was born," she says. "I had so much support from Sarah

my friend a band that said, 'well done for breastfeeding in church' which made us all feel more comfortable and welcome."

Eleanor Dodsworth stresses the importance of reaching out for professional support. "Health visitors came to my

house every day as my baby was struggling to latch - and that's why I sing about the support they give," she says.

Sarah Winspear explained benefits of breastfeeding include stronger immunity from infections and diseases for baby and also reduced risk of breast cancer. She stressed that breastfeeding does not always work for everyone and support is available for ALL new mums.

Winspear, Infant Feeding Lead at the family hub, who was always there to help us. She does home visits and rents out things like breast pumps, and is a great support.

"When I started feeding in public for the first time, it was more my own confidence that was the worry. But one day a few of us were at a mini-music group at our local church and an older lady subtly handed

Heroine of the waves

WHEN Laura Wedgewood isn't working to support some of our most vulnerable children, you're likely to find her out on the waves saving lives.

For Laura is currently the only woman on Redcar Lifeboat and the first crew member to pass out as an Inshore Lifeboat (ILB) Navigator.

Now she is appealing for more members of our diverse community to consider joining the team.

Laura, Team Manager at the council's No Wrong Door Outreach Service and Residential Children's Home which supports children on the edge of care, laughed that she had "no idea" why she had joined the crew herself.

"I always get asked that and I don't really know," said

Laura, "I always make a joke of it by saying, 'stupidity'! I suppose it's to do with helping people which fits with my job at No Wrong Door. It's a huge commitment but I love it."

Her role on the lifeboat is very demanding, the team train twice per week and got called out 53 times last year, including Christmas Day. She said: "If the call comes, you go and that's it. There are two different tones to the pager, one that suggests there is an imminent life at risk and one which is for the crew to assemble at the station, for less urgent taskings. But if the call comes you just leave whatever you are doing. You could be half-way through paying for your shopping at the till as happens quite regularly.

"It can have an impact on family. They worry so much. It's the same with work colleagues. An email alert goes out to colleagues to let them know if I have been paged, so they know if I am going to be late, my team and in particular my Deputy Managers and Service Manager are incredibly supportive of what I do."

Laura, who said becoming the RNLI's new navigator was "hard work but one of my proudest achievements," explains that the job is not all about the classic image of saving someone caught in distress at sea. The RNLI covers some inland waterways too and the crew are often tasked to the River Tees.

She said the crew are "extremely close, like family," but added that the culture and crew at Redcar is ever changing. "You have to remember, we're actually older than the RNLI which is 200 years old. We have lifeboat families who have very proudly served for generation after generation which is amazing. But new people with different – transferrable – skills are increasingly needed too."

Teesside Hospice - Midnight Memory Walk



Racing will get under way at 9am for the women and 1pm for the men. Both races will start and finish near the bandstand in Saltburn.




Take Me to the Forest



Redcar foster carer backs recruitment drive

JUGGLING busy lives and the responsibility of their teenage son hasn't stopped Redcar foster carer Helen Laing and her husband Mark from providing a safe, secure and loving home to a foster child.

"I foster because I love children and want to make a positive difference to their lives," explained Helen. "We fostered the same child for three years and we are now fostering our second child and to see how they have transformed and thrived is something truly special."

Helen, originally from London, added: "Fostering can be so rewarding - you can provide a loving and safe home and show them that life can be fun as well as provide experiences they have never had before."

In England, every year we lose more foster carers than we gain. In the North East, we have the highest number of children referred into foster care of all regions and we desperately need more foster carers to offer help and support to children and young people in our communities.

Helen, who previously fostered through a private foster agency explains why she switched to foster for the council. "I was with a private fostering agency and did feel supported, but I then became friends with other foster carers and saw that they were getting a lot more in the way of training, communication and support. I felt the council could offer me a much better package so transferred across and things just run a lot smoother now."

For anyone thinking of becoming a foster carer Helen offers the following advice. "I would say just go for it. It's fun, it's exciting, it's interesting. You learn so much and there is never a dull moment. It is also important to have a good kind heart, to have patience and understanding and to be able to give a child a loving and safe home that they can thrive in."



50 years of giving back

FOR nearly fifty years, Trevor Welburn has been at the heart of his community in Brotton and he made friends across Europe. Saltburn.

Now 77, the grandfather-offour has dedicated his life to volunteering - something he first embraced at just 29 when he became treasurer of Brotton Youth Club. "I was an accountant. so my wife volunteered me for the job," Trevor recalls with an affectionate laugh.

More opportunities followed and, with a gentle nudge from his wife, Jean, he stepped into those roles.

Trevor became secretary of Teesside Rose Society, Area organiser for Teesside Music Eisteddfod and even helped run the Skelton & District Table Tennis

League. Through his involvement with the Eisteddfod music festival. "My family and I travelled to places like Belgium, Hungary, Sarajevo, and France thanks to the connections I made," he says.

Today, Trevor remains a driving force behind local initiatives as chairman of both the Saltburn 500 Club and the Brotton Improvement Group.

The Saltburn 500 Club has helped restore the town's pier, introduce a new bandstand, and organise Christmas lights and summer music. Meanwhile, the Brotton Improvement Club has brought the village to life with projects such statues and

the Brotton Wheel, a sculpture honouring the area's ironstone mining history.

As someone who loves children, Trevor also volunteers as a reader at St Peter's School, and he's known as East Cleveland's most beloved Santa Claus.

"I couldn't have done any of this without Jean - she's always been my biggest supporter," he says. "There's nothing special about me. I'm just a dot in the landscape, but I hope more people will step forward to carry on our work."

FOR the past six years, a dedicated group have helped tackle isolation while supporting people to gain skills, confidence and work experience.

Called Community Stepping Stones, the organisation based in Dormanstown, Redcar and Marske has made a difference to people's lives.

"Our vision, is to engage with people who are fairly isolated," explains Di Pearson, who cofounded the community interest company with Jo Foster.

With backgrounds in teaching, Di and Jo saw the gap between education and employment - especially for those with special education needs - and wanted to help bridge it. Their team runs several cafés and a thrift shop alongside various community activities.

Recently, they took over Laburnum Road Library, determined to save the much-



loved service. "I used to live nearby, and Jo still does," says Di. "We knew we had to step in."

Among their volunteers is Nathan Mortimer, 21, from Redcar. While studying catering, he helps run several groups and events. "I enjoy it - it gives me something to do, and I get on well with everyone," he says.

Jo has seen Nathan's confidence grow. "His progress has been absolutely massive and I'm really proud of him. He's developing his catering skills while learning vital transferable skills for his future."

Building a better borough

Redcar High Street

A CONTRACTOR has been appointed to carry out work to revitalise the look of the High Street with new paving, new street furniture, landscaping with plants and trees and improved lighting.

The contractor will phase these works to ensure minimum disruption to the shops on the High Street and the people using them. All businesses will be open as usual throughout the works.

The Redcar Town Deal team and the council are also working closely with the organisers of the town centre market to ensure that during each phase of works, an appropriately sized space is made available to ensure there is as little disruption to traders as possible. It is anticipated that work will start on the High Street this spring.



Family culture and entertainment venue in Redcar

WORKS are anticipated to start towards the end of spring for the exciting new family culture and entertainment venue and library in Redcar. Once complete, the venue will give families and friends more things to do, no matter the weather, and will bring more visitors to the high street which will support existing local businesses.

Following the demolition on the site of the former Marks and Spencer and Goodwins buildings, the walls of the neighbouring properties have been surveyed to inform party wall and legal agreements with adjoining property owners.

These surveys could only take place in full after demolition as there were large areas of the structure that were either inaccessible or not visible until demolition was complete. The surveys identified that a significant amount of additional work was required to bring the walls up to standard.

Active Travel Route

WITH funding from

The council and design teams are now analysing this feedback, which will inform the next steps.

Eston swimming pool

A STEEL beam has been signed by members of the local community as the construction of Eston Pool hit a major milestone.

The steel frame of the building has now been erected and one steel beam stands out among the others.

Norman Spencer, 95, proudly signed his name, and it is believed he was the first person to swim in the old pool when it first opened in 1960.

Names of swimmers from Eston Swim Club were also signed on the beam before it was placed on the structure, leaving a lasting legacy for the club.

The pool will be complete



in early 2026, thanks to funding from the Government, the council and Tees Valley Combined Authority.

Eston Precinct is also set to be demolished in early summer. This is to make way for

the proposed redevelopment aiming to provide high-quality retail facilities with improvements to the surrounding area including new paving, trees and benches.



Redcar Central Station

PROGRESS is being made at Redcar Central Station which is undergoing major conservation works. Windows to the south side of the building and areas of brickwork have been replaced. The roof has also been replaced and new solar panels have been installed.

The improvements to the Grade II listed station building will have a huge impact on the local community by introducing leisure and retail facilities and attracting more visitors to the station and nearby businesses.

The project is funded by the Government, Tees Valley Combined Authority and the Railway Heritage Trust. It will be complete by late 2025. The Council is currently accepting expressions of interest in taking space in the building if any local business owners are interested. Chapel Beck

THE council's planning committee has approved exciting plans to improve Chapel Beck in Guisborough.

The active travel route will lead through the main thoroughfare of the park with a widened footpath accommodating both pedestrians and cyclists. Enhanced lighting will also be added along the route. The project will also see the cleaning up of the beck, the installation of picnic benches, planting and trees.

Your council plans £30m investment

A MULTI-MILLION pound investment plan to meet unprecedented demand for services has been developed by your council for the coming financial year.

To keep up with this demand, an investment of £30.7 million is proposed for the next financial year which starts in April. The largest part of the investment would support and protect vulnerable children and adults.

The plan also includes £8.8 million in efficiencies and increased revenue. This includes developing our own accommodation for children in our care and the sale of land and buildings which are not needed to provide frontline services.

There has been a significant increase in the number of children coming into care in Redcar and Cleveland, particularly those with complex needs who require specialist care in residential accommodation.

We have a legal duty to provide suitable accommodation, and a shortage of places nationally means the cost of this has risen significantly in recent years. The average cost for residential and supported accommodation for young people who require specialist care and support is £330,000 each per year.

Despite the huge demand for services, your council expected to put forward a balanced budget, unlike some other local authorities nationally.

Elsewhere in the country, some councils have required Government help and, in some cases, commissioners have been appointed to run councils. This often means severe cuts to frontline services, which has a serious effect on residents. Councils can also be forced to sell off assets to address their financial deficits, and to implement much larger Council Tax increases.

The council hopes the development of the Teesworks site will provide significant income through Business Rates in the years to come if companies which have expressed interest in locating there set up business.

We receive Business Rates when companies start operating on the site, and payments which are expected in the coming year have been factored into the budget for 2025/26

Now we are waiting for confirmation of starting dates for other companies, which will hopefully mean your council will be in a stronger financial position in future years.

Fighting the fly-tippers

Fly-tippers have been warned that they now face fines of £1,000 – up from £400 – for dumping waste on the street. We talked to the officers bringing the fly-tippers to justice.

JAMIE Lee spends his working life leading teams on the frontline in the fight against flytipping. He is under no illusions that the problem isn't going to go away any time soon.

"Our teams leaflet residents, investigate and monitor dumped waste but, still, there is an unbelievable amount of dumped waste that has to be picked up from the streets every day," says Jamie, Environment Manager. "But that doesn't mean we stop...it just means we fight harder."

Jamie coordinates three teams made up of experienced staff on the frontline who gather



any evidence they can from the scene and from neighbours and sometimes face abuse. Jamie said: "The abuse of staff is totally unacceptable and highlights the challenges the teams face on a daily basis". As well as reporting evidence the teams pick up more than 6,000 fly-tips of waste each year.

Doug Gray, Community Enforcement Team Manager, said that evidence their teams collect was invaluable. He and his

officers also act on information and tip-offs from residents, community patrol officers, police and other agencies.

He said: "It can just be straightforward and a case of issuing a Fixed Penalty Notice to the perpetrator. However, sometimes it might involve going to court which we don't flinch from."

A page dedicated to reporting fly-tipping is available on the council's website.

'Tagging' recycling bins

YOU may have noticed recently that some recycling bins across the borough have been tagged and left unemptied.

The tags detail what can and cannot go into your recycling bin. This is all part of a borough-wide scheme to reduce the amount of contamination – items that shouldn't be in recycling.

Residents are then asked to remove the contaminants so that their bin can then be

emptied on their next scheduled collection. If residents continue to have problems about what can and cannot go in their recycling bin, the authority will be in touch to advise why the bin has been tagged, either by letter or a visit. The team will always continue to work with residents to help them recycle. However in some extreme cases if the contamination continues a recycling bin may be removed.

Just say no to cold calling fraudsters

IT'S been 10 years since the council launched its No Cold Calling Home scheme which empowers residents to say no to cold callers on their doorstep.

More than 2,000 packs have been handed out directly to residents by Trading Standards, with many more being distributed by the council's libraries and partners, including police.

By displaying a 'no cold calling' sticker and following the advice contained in the council's No Cold Calling Home pack, it's hoped cold callers will be deterred from door knocking

and that residents will have the confidence to say no. Any incidents that do occur may be reported to Trading Standards.

Cold callers may include representatives from legitimate companies, unscrupulous sales people and rogue traders.

Rogue traders typically offer home improvement and gardening work which often starts out as a small job but escalates into work costing thousands of pounds.

Jodie Allwood, Trading Standards Team Leader said: "Rogue traders are increasingly presenting themselves as legitimate businesses with websites, professionally produced flyers and liveried (signed) vans. Vulnerable residents are most at risk of being left with sub-standard work, incomplete work, damage to property and, in some instances, no work at all."

Trading Standards advise that before agreeing to work, residents should ensure that they have carried out background checks on the business, that they have full business details and a written contract.

Roads investment continues



INVESTMENT on the borough's roads and streets is continuing with latest figures showing that 1,490sqm of road have had permanent patch repairs.

A six-year resurfacing programme is continuing on our roads and footpaths and 1,572 potholes have been filled in the current financial year.

The council is also investing in fleet and machinery to make them more cost-efficient and environmentally friendly.


