### **Urgent – General Exception - Reasons for urgency outlined below**

Redcar & Cleveland Borough Council as lead applicant and accountable body, in partnership with Middlesbrough Council, Stockton Borough Council, and Tees Valley Wildlife Trust, and others, have been successful securing a Nature Towns and Cities Grant for the Tees Urban Nature Network project. Led by the National Trust, National Lottery Heritage Fund (NLHF), and Natural England, the Nature Towns and Cities programme supports councils and communities to embed people and nature at the heart of urban regeneration.

The Council were notified by NLHF on 10 July 2025 that the TUNN proposal has been selected by the evaluation panel to receive funding. A deadline of 7 August 2025 to confirm acceptance of the funding has been imposed by the funder, warranting the request to take a general exception to the Delegated Decision Forward Plan requirement to publish the decision record for 28 days in advance of the decision being taken. Without the general exception the Council is at risk of not fulfilling mandatory grant conditions and forfeiting the grant allocation.

This request is compliant with the requirements of the general exception process, with the Climate and Environment Scrutiny improvement Committee Chair, the Cabinet Member for Environment, Sustainability and Culture, and the Leader having received written notification of the matter to which the decision is to be made.

The 3-year project is expected to start on 1st August 2025 and will end 31st July 2028.

#### **Background to decision:**

In October 2024 the Government launched the Nature Towns and Cities programme led by The National Lottery Heritage Fund, National Trust, and Natural England. The programme aims to embed people and nature at the heart of urban regeneration, offering revenue grants of between £250,000 to £1 million from a £15 million UK wide aspiring to enable 100 towns and cities to become better places to live and work.

Redcar and Cleveland Borough Council (RCBC) as lead applicant and accountable body, in partnership with Middlesbrough Council (MA), Stockton Borough Council (SBC) and Tees Valley

Wildlife Trust (TVWT) have successfully secured funding from the Nature Towns and Cities grant for the Tees Urban Nature Network (TUNN) 3-year project.

A broad network of cross-sector partners co-developed the full bid and delivery structure through an extensive series of online and in-person workshops. The approach aligns with relevant local and national policy and supports embedding learning and best practice from successful local place-based initiatives such as You've Got This and Nextdoor Nature.

The grant allocation of £649,000, alongside match funding and in-kind contributions, will support TUNN to build the capacity and capabilities of communities and partners to deliver nature recovery, and secure sustainable investment in blue and green infrastructure.

The 3-year funding aims to empower communities by building capacity through inclusive, evidence-based engagement, particularly for marginalised groups. It supports training for community organisations to participate in decision-making and manage green and blue spaces equitably. The project will host events to share learning, establish a collaborative network of partners, and recruit key staff to lead the initiative. It also includes participation in regular learning sessions, working towards Nature Towns and Cities accreditation, and developing a long-term sustainability plan focused on partnerships, policy influence, green finance, and community involvement.

To accept the grant funding total allocation of £649,000 from The National lottery Heritage Fund, grant conditions and formal contract must be adhered to.

#### Full details of decision:

Redcar and Cleveland Borough Council (RCBC), Middlesbrough Council (MA), Stockton Borough Council (SBC) and Tees Valley Wildlife Trust (TVWT) known as the TUNN Partnership Management Team have entered a formal collaborative agreement with each other.

Approval is requested to accept the grant funding award of £649,000 on behalf of the partnership as lead applicant and accountable body.

The project is to commence in August 2025 and will end on 31 July 2028.

#### Reasons for Decision:

This investment will nurture collaboration between communities, local authorities, nature organisations, education establishments, businesses, and community groups. It will unite and empower communities to lead transformational change and work towards unlocking innovative new finance models to reimagine and sustain green infrastructure in urban areas.

The decision supports several strategic aims including:

#### 1. Nature Recovery & Environmental Sustainability

- Restore, connect, and enhance habitats across the urban core of the tri-borough area.
- Address habitat fragmentation and improve ecological connectivity.
- Support community resilience through nature-based climate adaptation.
- Build the value of nature in communities, transforming green/blue spaces to valued community assets.

#### 2. Community Empowerment & Engagement

- Enable and support communities to participate, co-create, lead change, and engage creatively with green/blue spaces.
- Build collective capacity and support training, skills development, volunteering, citizen science, and non-academic routes to employment in the environment sector.

- Develop a pipeline of innovative and investable green/blue infrastructure projects.
- Explore innovative mechanisms to sustain investment in green/blue infrastructure and deliver multiple environmental, economic, social and health benefits.
- Build long-term funding strategies to reduce reliance on short-term grants and ensure the sustainability of our natural assets.

#### Details of alternative options considered (if any) and reasons for rejection:

Do not accept the funding – Rejected - Local Authorities are experiencing increasing budgetary pressures resulting in underinvestment in green infrastructure. External capital grant funding is unsustainable and offers little opportunity to achieve the magnitude of change required, nor sustain any investments made due to restricted capacity to take on additional maintenance of new or improved assets in existing teams. Additional capacity is required to support the development of new ways of working, and to tackle some of the issues affecting progress.
